We surprised Director Emeritus Mark Varnau of STA parish on his 90th birthday with a ceremonial \$9,090 check from a successful Pantry fundraiser. Acclaimed Boston, Mass. drummers and buglers in Indy for a national competition donated **825 pounds** of food to us!

2024-BY THE NUMBERS



The ratio of donated to purchased food was 70 percent to 30 percent.



Solar panels generated 26,686 kWh (60 percent of our electricity) saving \$2,969.



Pounds of food received: 658,685 up 8 percent. Value of food donated was \$1.93/pound.



Pounds of food donated from STA, SJOA, CTK, StL, and IHM: 55,241 up one percent.
